OVERSIZED TRUCK ALERT

KGA MEMBERS ARE URGED TO SEND A LETTER OPPOSING THE DESIGNATION OF ROUTE 27 AS A LARGE TRUCK ROUTE THROUGH KINGSTON.

This designation will make Route 27 a "New Jersey Access Network" thoroughfare for oversized trucks--double-trailer combinations and 102-inch wide trucks, the biggest "standard" trucks now on the road (around 70 feet long).

This will erode the quality of life in our village and adversely affect local residences and businesses on Route 27. Route 27 was built for local traffic, not heavy truck traffic. Large tractor trailer trucks are major contributors to gridlock and cause more road surface and infrastructure damage than smaller vehicles do. This designation, if passed, will result in more truck traffic, unsafe road conditions for

pedestrians, bicyclists and local drivers, increased noise and air pollution, and will discourage visitors to the historic village of Kingston, the D&R Canal State Park, and the Kingston Lock area.

Please consider writing a letter to your local paper, as well as one to NJDOT. NUMBERS DO COUNT. The New Jersey Department of Transportation has said that the number of people who send comments will affect whether they exclude a given stretch of road.

NJDOT is receiving comments on the new parking rules until **February 16, 2007**. Please address your comments to: Mr. Kris Kolluri, Commissioner NJ Department of Transportation, PO Box 601, 1035 Parkway Avenue Trenton, NJ 08625-0601. You need only ask that Route 27 in Kingston be removed from the New Jersey Access Network under the proposed statewide truck routing regulations (N.J.A.C. 16:32, Truck Access). Sign your name and give your address, and on the envelope mark your letter 'Re: N.J.A.C. 16:32 Truck Access" to expedite delivery to the appropriate office. **Send it to Miriam Crum, Administrative Practice Officer, NJDOT Bureau of Administrative Practice and Public Law Implementation, PO Box 600, Trenton, NJ 08625-0600.**

PAST EVENTS

Audubon Christmas Bird Count... The Christmas Bird Count is an early-winter bird census, where volunteers count every bird they see or hear all day in a specified area. It's not just a species tally—all birds are counted all day, giving an indication of the total number of birds in the counting area that day. More than 50,000 observers participate each year. The results of their efforts are compiled into the longest-running database in ornithology, representing over a century of data on trends of early-winter bird populations across the Americas.

Count results from the Kingston segment of the 2006 Christmas Bird Count (see attached) indicate that we had an excellent year! - 51 species (a new high), 6 new species, high counts for 11 of the species that we had on our cumulative list, and a respectable 3720 total of birds! If you want to join us for the 2007 count, it will be held on 12/16 – call Karen for more information (609-683-0483). It is a great way to hone your skills and to get into the great outdoors.



October 22: KGA Fall Foliage Walk...The 2006 fall foliage walk, our first on the Princeton Nurseries Lands, was the best we ever had. Two very special co-leaders--KGA Trustee and nurseryman Bill Flemer IV, and Jim Consolloy, the Head Grounds Manager for Princeton University--shared their enthusiasm and expertise. Bill is a member of the Flemer family, which founded Princeton Nurseries, so he has an intimate knowledge of the wholesale nursery business that once thrived at this site. Jim Consolloy is responsible for maintaining Princeton University's 2300 acres and over 400 species of trees.

The 50 people who attended the walk were treated to a wealth of Princeton Nurseries History, and tips on tree identification, highlighting not only native trees, but also specimens of Princeton Nurseries'

unique cultivars, such as the 'Princeton Sentry' Ginkgo, and 'Bonfire' and 'Goldspire' sugar maples, aflame in their glorious fall colors.

The previous day, many KGA members attended the Reptiles & Raptors & More ~ OH MY! event at Mapleton Preserve, hosted by the D&R Canal State Park and Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands. They were treated to a "hands on" program by snake educator Gerry Wronski who provided an "up close and personal" experience with his cooperative reptiles. Then in the afternoon, licensed falconer Jennifer Pena presented a program that focused on the four birds of prey she brought with her – two hawks, a falcon and an owl. Ms. Pena shared her experience working with these magnificent birds including their nesting habits, hunting adaptations, and flight patterns. All of this was accompanied by some aweinspiring flight demonstrations – one of the birds even flew off and took a bath, and returned soaking wet.
